SPCA CAT SEIZURE

In November the SPCA seized 64 cats from a house in Muncy. Many of these cats had health issues including respiratory and eye infections. Left untreated, these infections resulted in several of the cats suffering from compromised vision or blindness.

Though LAPS wasn't looking to take in more residents, we felt we should do what we could to help save a few of these cats. After a phone call to Vickie at the SPCA, two LAPS representatives went to the SPCA to choose 3 cats to bring to LAPS. There were a rainbow of both personalities and colors, so obviously this wasn't an easy task, you wanted to save them all. Therefore, we allowed 3 children to pick out the cats.

Emily, who was a very young, pregnant tabby was chosen by Shana. Emily was chosen because the SPCA only likes to have one pregnant cat at a time and this allowed the room for another pregnant female into the SPCA. Emily gave birth to 4 kittens on December 28, 2007, however, two of those kittens were stillborn. Emily and her two surviving babies are doing well.

Haley is a beautiful long-haired dark calico female chosen by Taylor. She is very friendly, affectionate and playful. Haley has since been spayed, tested, vaccinated and found her forever home. Skippy is a handsome long-haired orange and white male chosen by Zoey. He was one of the unfortunate cats with the untreated eye infection that left him blind in one eye. The infection was so severe that it caused his eye to shrivel. This eye may eventually need to be removed and sewn shut if it starts showing signs of irritation due to debris. (So far, it isn't causing any problems.) The other eye appears somewhat cloudy but has improved greatly with treatment. Skippy is outrageously playful. He loves everyone and is adored by all who meet him. Skippy had an adoption pending a week after he arrived and has since gotten well enough to go to his new home!

There were also 4 cats from the entire group that were completely blind. In an effort to save these 4 cats, LAPS volunteer Gwen contacted two blind cat rescues, one of which agreed to take the 4 cats if they could be fostered until January plus spayed/neutered, tested and vaccinated. The rescue, Blind Cat Rescue located in St. Pauls, NC, is currently in the process of erecting a new building which is planned for completion by the end of January 2008. However, it has since been learned that the SPCA has adopted 2 of those blind cats for their facility. Kudos to the SPCA for realizing the potential of these cats! Also a huge thank you to Vickie at the SPCA for working with LAPS on getting the remaining 2 blind cats ready for transport to Blind Cat Rescue and Gwen at LAPS for finding a facility and arranging transportation for these 2 cats.

It is amazing the level of playfulness and affection displayed by the five cats that LAPS helped from this Muncy house and it was obvious when we visited the whole group at the SPCA how loving these cats were.

LAPS SPONSOR/FOSTER PROGRAM

If you can't adopt due to allergies or already have a pet and don't feel that you can bring another into your home but you would still like to help, LAPS has a sponsorship program that may meet your needs.

As a no-kill organization, LAPS provides housing, food, companionship, and medical care for an indefinite period of time, sometimes for the balance of an animal's life. Some of the shelter residents may be hard-to-place due to age, personality, or disability. As long as a good quality of life is possible, the kitty will always have a home with proper veterinary care, regular vaccines, a healthy diet, spaying/neutering, and other necessary care. This can all be costly but it is the commitment of the organization.

The Sponsor/Foster Pet Program helps to provide funding to continue the care that the cats receive in the shelter. For just \$15.00 per month, your special friend will be assured of the best care possible and, if an emergency arises or care beyond a normal situation is required, this special funding helps to ensure that the other operating funds of the shelter will not be strained.

Your special friend will be chosen at random from the residents unless you choose to visit the shelter personally and make your own choice. LAPS will provide you with a photo of the kitty you sponsor if you request one along with other information you may wish to know about your new friend. If the kitty is adopted, you will be notified and, hopefully, you will decide to choose another friend to aid.

This chart represents one unspayed female, her mate and all of her offspring, producing 2 litters per year, with 2.8 surviving kittens per litter: Unspayed/Unneutered 1 Year: 12 Cats & Kittens: 2 Years: 67 Years: 11,80 Years: 66,088 Years: 370,092 Years: 2,072,514

By spaying and neutering just one male and one female cat, more than 2,000 unwanted births can be prevented in just four years – and more than 2 million in 8 years!



FAREWELL to some friends



RANDY arrived at LAPS in September 1997 as a kitten. He was a handsome black guy with a white chest and belly. Randy battled upper respiratory problems his whole life. In November 2007 he was diagnosed with diabetes and taken into foster care. His foster home was the home of the same volunteer who fostered him as a kitten in 1997. Randy crossed the Rainbow Bridge on July 31, 2007 due to an auto-immune disease.

HARLEY was a beautifully marked, and affectionate, black and white female who came to LAPS in January 2006 after being abandoned by her owner. She was 11 years old at the time and had been diagnosed with hyperthyroid disease, which is treatable with medication. In November 2006 Harley was diagnosed with asthma at which point she was taken into foster care. Harley did well until May 2007 when she was diagnosed with gall bladder problems. She crossed the Rainbow Bridge on October 29, 2007.

LING came to LAPS in August 2006. She was a gorgeous, but temperamental, 18-year old tortoiseshell/siamese mix whose owner had passed away. Due to her age, she was immediately taken into foster care. Upon Ling's arrival, it was discovered that she was in kidney failure and was predicted to live only 6 to 12 months. Ling was content and kept comfortable until exactly one year after her arrival. On August 2, 2007 Ling was assisted across the Rainbow Bridge at her foster home by Dr. Beth Crombie DVM from Lewisburg Veterinary Hospital. Her ashes were spread on the grave of her owner, with the approval of the family.

ROSALEE came to LAPS in July 1998 after being surrendered by her owner. She was a beautiful tortoiseshell with a loving personality. She would often let the volunteers know that she wanted attention, food or walk-about privilege. In February 2007, Rosalee was diagnosed with an inoperable tumor (cancer). She was kept comfortable and monitored on a daily basis. On the night of August 22, 2007 Rosalee was out of her room walking about with shelter resident Troubles. When the evening shift left, Rosalee was sleeping comfortably in Troubles's room so she was allowed to stay there. Sometime during the night Rosalee passed away peacefully in her sleep with her friend Troubles nearby.

THREE TOES was a handsome black and white tuxedo male brought to LAPS in November 2004, with his brother Tiggy, after their owner passed away. Both boys were 13-years old at the time. In March 2007 Three Toes was diagnosed with diabetes at which point he was taken into foster care. On December 20, 2007 Three Toes was assisted across the Rainbow Bridge after he stopped eating and it was discovered that he had a tumor in his intestinal tract.

It is with great sadness and much regret that PENELOPE must be added to our farewell list. This angelic little girl fought the fight. Unfortunately, since our last update, Penelope's health went downhill fast. She started to lose control of her bladder and bowel. It appeared as though the nerves along her spine were dying. All treatment options had been exhausted, there was no more that could medically be done to fix Penelope's broken body. Volunteer Kerri stepped up to the plate and on August 27, 2007 Kerri and Dr. Mary Lou Beers VMD from Loyalsock Animal Hospital assisted Penelope across the Rainbow Bridge. Our little Penelope was just 1-year old. The Board of Directors voted to apply the funds raised to help Penelope with her eye surgery via our Pennies for Penelope Campaign to our outstanding veterinary bill.

Please remember that LAPS is a 501(c)3 organization and all contributions are tax-deductible. Tax receipts are available upon request.


LAPS IS ON EBAY
